Frequently Asked Questions

1. My child is not able to do the things that other children his / her age can do. How do I know if he/she needs help?

From the moment of their birth, children are constantly learning! Learning how to use their bodies, their voices; learning to use their brains, and to manage their emotions. They are developing new skills as they grow and learn. Parents and guardians need to pay attention to the signs or milestones of your child's development.

It is important for you to be aware of the children's developmental milestones so you can know when to expect your child to learn new skills, such as crawling, walking, and talking, playing alone or with others. Sometimes children have delays in development. Knowing about these signs of typical development give you a clear set of skills to keep an eye one

2. Who can I contact for help?

If you have concerns about your child's development, you can speak with your district nurse or doctor at your local health centre, or with your private health care provider. They will check on your child's progress on with regard to these milestones during routine visits. These visits will give you a chance to ask questions or talk about the concerns you might have.

In the school setting, you can also discuss your concerns with your child's teacher or with members of the Student Support Services Division.

3. My child is of school age and has a disability. Can I access placement at a general education public school?

Yes. The Inclusive Education Policy (2009) states that "All children regardless of their physical intellectual, social, emotional or other conditions are entitled to schooling and an opportunity to be supported by the State" (pg. 5).

Parents may seek placement for their children with or without disabilities at schools within or near their areas of residence. Ask to speak with the Principal or member of the School-Based Intervention Team about the registration process.

Placement of children of school-age at any public school falls under the purview of the Division of School Supervision and Management. If you have tried several schools and are having difficulties in gaining admission for your child, please visit your Education District Office for your area and ask to speak with a School Supervisor. 4. Can my child's special needs be met in the general education setting?



Many students with various types and degrees of disability have received schooling within general settings with the support of administrators, teachers and personnel from the Student Student Support Services Division. Special accommodations may be required for some students with severe to profound physical and/or developmental disabilities. The principal of any receiving school may refer a student requiring additional support to the Student Support Services Division immediately upon the child's registration at the school.

In consultation with Special Education Personnel of SSSD, the particular needs of a student will be assessed. Through the screening and consultation process, appropriate support services may be identified, and the most desirable placement options may be explored.

If a student's particular needs cannot be immediately or adequately met within the general public education school system, the student may be referred to a public special school.

5. My child is in a general education setting but I think he / she needs additional support. What can I do?

A student in need of special education support and intervention, educational guidance, counselling, or social work services usually displays learning or behavioral problems within the classroom setting. Be sure to discuss your concerns with your child's class teacher or the School's Principal.

You may also request to be referred to the Student Support Services Officer assigned to your child's school. Request an appointment to speak with the Special Education Officer, Guidance Officer, or School Social Worker at your school to discuss your child's specific challenges.

Through such consultation, you may be able to access the additional support and intervention your child needs. Support may be available in the form of screening and assessment, alternative intervention strategies, additional resources and /or classroom support.

8. Is home schooling an option for my child with a disability?



Home Schooling is an option for parents of students with or without disabilities. The Special Education Unit of Student Support Services Division may offer consultation and advisory services for parents opting to homeschool their child with special needs due to the presence of a disability. The Unit may also facilitate referrals to external support agencies as required.

9. My child with special needs is registered for an examination. What supports are available for him/her?

The Ministry of Education caters for students with disabilities and other special needs writing local examinations through the provision of special examination concessions. Special concessions (Alternative Arrangements) are intended to level the playing field for students whose

disabilities/special needs negatively impact their performance.

These arrangements are outlined in the "Policy Guidelines for the Provision of Alternative Arrangements (Special Concessions) for Students Writing Local Examinations".
